At the time, we lived in Burlingame where Bob personally remodeled the kitchen, two baths (his work was featured in Sunset Magazine) and built two additional decks. In 1976 Bob joined his friend in a south bay law practice and moved the family to Saratoga. His first project, with his sons, was to remodel and add on to the property's guest cottage, renting it for the princely sum of \$400 per month!

In 1983 Bob retired and, always creative and eager to take on new challenges, became our personal chef. His meals were legendary and he took great pride in the food he served family and friends. Never complacent to rest on his laurels, he took on the new rewarding hobby of oil painting and, as with most everything Bob set his mind to, became an amazing artist. His work decorates our homes in Saratoga and Santa Cruz, as well as the homes of many family and friends.

In 1989 he purchased a GMC motorhome, we joined their club, made many new friends and travelled to many places including the National Parks, Canada, and Mexico. Bob enjoyed other travels, as well. The first overseas adventure was exchanging our home with a family from Winchester, England (including a dog and car). Other trips included the European Continent, Africa, South East Asia, Israel, India, Turkey, Russia, China (twice) Indonesia, Australia, New Zealand, Central and South America and, of course, wonderful North America.

He passed away peacefully on his own terms at home, surrounded by the people and things he loved most.
